Resurrection?! Rev. Paul Browning

A dear member from a former congregation called me and shared that when recently visiting her sister the subject of Easter and Resurrection came up. Her sister was dismissive of this woman's faith and of the United church saying, "My church really believes in the resurrection".

The member's sister was obviously intending to "witness" to her because she handed the visiting sister a copy of her minister's sermon on the resurrection which clearly proclaimed that if someone does not believe in the physical resurrection of Jesus they cannot be a Christian.

The sermon said there were only two possibilities: either the physical body of Jesus rose from the dead, (his point of view) or the resurrection stories are simply myths no basis in fact.

I explained that I seldom accept polarities. Things are not generally this way or that; they are a bit of this and a bit of that. Without balance, truth gets lost and wisdom with it. In this case, the resurrection is a fact that led to the creation of Christianity and the resurrection is explained by richly symbolic stories.

The Resurrection stories, beginning with Paul's letter to the Corinthians and later contained in the gospel's, make it clear that something amazing happened after Jesus' death. People became so convinced that the risen Christ was real and present to them that they changed from being fearful to becoming courageous, loving people. As a result, the church was given its birth, years after Jesus' death.

The apostle Paul never known Jesus and was a member of the secret police arresting Christians. He experienced the resurrected presence of Christ in a vision which affected him so profoundly that he became the church's greatest promoter.



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Paul's writings, which are the earliest in the New Testament, is clear that the resurrection is about a spiritual, not a physical reality. He writes in 1 st Corinthians 15, "In death we die a physical body and are raised a spiritual body...flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God".

All the resurrection stories in the gospels emphasize an ambiguity about Jesus' physical body. Mary sees the risen Christ but does not recognize him until he speaks her name, thus indicating that for her, the resurrection was about feeling reconnected to him rather than physically seeing him.

Another story tells of Jesus walking with two people who do not recognize him until they eat together, a reference to experiencing the presence of Christ in the Communion meal. In fact, in all the resurrection stories, people do not recognize the physical body of Jesus when they experienced his risen presence.

The laws of the physical world do not have to be set aside for the power of Spirit of Spirit to flow in us and through us! "That which is born of flesh is flesh, and that which is born of Spirit is Spirit" (Jesus).


We are a resurrection people because something extraordinary happened after Jesus died. The powers of domination thought they had gotten rid of Jesus challenging them to become a people of love and to create a more humane society.

Yet, 2000 years of history evidence the miracle that the world, against all odds, has become increasingly kinder. Christians have played a leadership role in the evolution of democracy, the constitutional rule of law and the recognition of human rights.

We are here, in our lives and as a church, doing the work of Jesus. Like the early followers of Jesus who experienced his love and support even when his body was no longer with them, we too experience his continuing presence which, sometimes against all odds, gives us the courage, hope, meaning and the capacity to Love too.



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


